Flowers (AB)

Looking back at 2022, the weather caused some unusual events in the plant world, some more noticeable than others. The drought and exceptional heat through July and August caused many trees to drop leaves while still green, and the autumn colours appeared late, with some oak trees remaining green for longer than usual: even when they had finally turned brown, some have held their leaves until Christmas and even the New Year.

In late August the rain returned and continued into the extremely wet autumn, when we experienced unusually warm weather with thunderstorms into mid-November. This brought on a rash of seedlings from both annuals and biennials, with lush new growth of vivid green grasses. The first frosts finally came with a vengeance in December, with 10 days of deep freeze. In other years, many plants on the Common would have continued flowering, with some 'spring' flowers such as the Primrose beginning in autumn, but at the end of this year everything is 'on hold'.
