

News from the Working party Bealeswood Common, on Sunday 19th November.

Vicky, the Bealeswood Common Ranger, organised a working party to execute essential maintenance on Bealeswood Common, going into the winter. On a clear and sunny Sunday morning 19th November at 10am, we met at the bench at the top of the Common.

There was a fantastic turnout with Vicky bringing some help from her regular volunteering crew and with several willing volunteers from Dockenfield, Frensham, Rowledge and Farnham, we all eagerly rolled up our sleeves and dived in to help. Using hand tools only, we coppiced, cut back, and pruned sections of scrub beside the paths from the Bluebell Pub and down towards Lake Lane with a view to allowing some of the smaller and more delicate flower species to thrive in the coming year and with the hope that increasing the light and reducing competition that the remaining trees and shrubs will strengthen and bush out with the coming spring, providing better cover and new habitat for nesting birds. We also opened up an area of deep shade within the woodland by strategically removing some spindly holly and hawthorn whips resulting in a bright glade where the sun warmed the autumn leaf litter hopefully encouraging some rarer woodland plant species to poke their heads through in the spring. Hard work was done, coffee and biscuits, and later on, packed lunches were devoured by the hungry, happy workers and we all left feeling tired, satisfied and cobweb free secure in the knowledge of a job well done.

WILD DOCKENFIELD: A CELEBRATION OF BIODIVERSITY IN A CHANGING CLIMATE.

On October 27th the Church of the Good Shepherd was almost filled to capacity to hear about the wildlife on Bealeswood Common and surrounding areas. Ably introduced and chaired by **Anne Tutt**, the talks were a lively round-up of the findings of the village's Bealeswood Wildlife Recording Group (BWRG), with subjects including trees, wildflowers, butterflies, bees and wasps, birds and fungi as summarised below:

Colin Hall introduced the Common, which lies at the heart of our village, as a wooded common largely surrounded by Oak trees. Many of these show evidence of pollarding where particular branches had been cut and sold off as valuable timber. Felled oaks have recorded ages of up to 150 years, but others are significantly older. Trees, together with surrounding scrub, are significant habitats for wildlife and dead and decaying fallen trees are also havens of biodiversity.

Dan Bosence told us about his long-term (15 years) of weekly recording of the flowering times of the many flowers (180 species) on the Common. This shows that although dates of flowering fluctuate from year to year, on average these have stayed at around the few weeks. However, some of our Spring flowers (Lesser Celandine and Dog Violet) show a trend of earlier and earlier flowering over the 15 years. This is in line with national averages of UK plants that are known to be flowering one month earlier than they did 70 years ago, due to our warming climate.

Philippa Hall gave an overview of the butterflies that occur in the different habitats on the Common. Many have all stages of their life cycle closely tied to the grass communities, either specific grasses or the diverse grass community. Others are tied for nectar and larval food to particular native flowers, the ash and oak trees, or the abundant blackthorn. In addition, there are butterflies that are recorded that are just passing through the Common as natives, or as summer migrants. Recent years has seen records of breeding colonies of the rare Hairstreak butterflies.

Alex Potts uses a combination of extreme patience and expertise in macrophotography to record the bees and wasps on the Common. Many of the UK's Bumblebees occur with their colonial nests and their preferred nectar flowers are recorded with her stunning photographs of these hairy pollinators on different wildflowers on the Common. In addition, the habits of solitary bees are recorded that inhabit tunnels in the ground. These include the rarely reported Long Horned Bee. Examples of predatory Wasps and the Common European Hornet have also been recorded.

Alan Cox took a wider view of the birds of the Surrey-Hampshire border area. His review, covering his years of observation 1997-2023, highlighted the birds we have lost in this area (Little Owl, Willow Tit, Turtle Dove, and Yellowhammer) due to changing climate but also local agricultural practices. Other birds are in decline (Cuckoo, Spotted Flycatcher, Skylark, and Green and Bullfinch). On a more positive note, he listed a number of new arrivals to our area (Little Egret, Buzzard, Red Kite, Raven, Firecrest, Egyptian Goose and, the less welcome, Ring-Necked Parakeet).

Amanda Adolph concluded with an illustrated talk on our fungi and the different habitats in which they live. The grassland fungi are characterised by the waxcaps (indicators of ancient grasslands), the Russulas, Parasols and Wood Blewits, whilst shaded areas and scrub edges have their own associations (White Knight, White Saddle, Buttery collybia and Yellow clubs). The broad-leaved woodland areas are typified by the Bonnets, Boletes, Earthballs, Agarics and the Charcoal Burner but the fallen trees and stumps have their own special communities.

The evening concluded with discussions on the presentations accompanied by tea, coffee, and home-made cakes together with sales (in aid of church upkeep) of the 2024 Wildlife Calendar from the Alex and Alan. Copies (£8.00 each) can still be obtained from the Frensham Village Shop or contact alanficox@gmail.com. The event was free to attend but donations in support of our village church were collected and together with Calendar sales the takings totalled some £238.50.



South Downs National Park.

Internationally Designated Dark Skies Reserve.

We are lucky enough to live in a spectacular little corner of the planet and as well as beautiful landscapes, fascinating wildlife, and a friendly community we are blessed to have some of the darkest skies in Southern England. We only need to step outside on a clear night to see the amazing canvas of the night sky, liberally scattered with stars and the Milky Way a bright streak overhead.

In May 2016 the South Downs National Park became the newest International Dark Skies Reserve (IDSR). It has since been joined by others and is now part of a family of 19 IDSR's around the world.

Our star-studded skies are as valuable as our beautiful rolling landscapes and, with properly dark skies in the Southeast of England under threat, the skies of the South Downs are worth protecting.

All of us living in the area bordering the Alice Holt Dark Sky reserve can play a part in protecting and preserving that deep, dark, spectacular night sky.

The South Downs National Park has issued some excellent guidelines called: **Light to Protect the Night.** They recommend five principles for responsible outdoor lighting, most of which are energy saving too.

- Useful: All light should have a clear purpose. Before installing or replacing a light, determine if the light is needed. Could reflective paints or self-luminous markers for signs, curbs and steps be used to reduce the need for permanent outdoor lighting.
- Targeted: Light should be directed only where needed. Use shielding and careful aiming to target the direction of the light beam so that it only points downwards and does not spill beyond where it is needed.
- Low Light Levels: Light should be no brighter than necessary. Use the lowest light level required. Be mindful of surface conditions as some surfaces may reflect more light into the night sky than intended.
- Controlled: Light should be used only when it is useful. Use controls such as timers or motion detectors to ensure that light is available when it is needed, and turned off when it is not.
- Colour: Use warmer colour lights where possible. Limit the amount of shorter wavelength (blue-violet) light to the least amount possible. Use yellow spectrum light bulbs where possible.

Over the festive season, if you choose to put up Xmas lights in celebration, do try to use warmer spectrum lighting. Turning them off a bit earlier is kinder to night-time wildlife and, try to remember not to leave them on all night, do switch them off when you retire to your beds.

By following these simple guidelines, we can do our bit to safeguard our dark skies, the insects, birds, and animals that inhabit them and, save on energy costs and usage too.

Bealeswood Common Wildlife. November 2023.

Bealeswood Wildlife Recording Group.

This month our bulletin board focuses on the third kingdom of the Tree of Life - Fungi.

Fungi provide a life force that is crucial to Animal and Plant wellbeing. Recent science has shown their role in the evolution and sustainability of planetary life.

The first land plants evolved 540 million years ago through interaction(symbiosis) with fungi. Fungi absorbed huge quantities of carbon dioxide and created oxygen on such a gigantic scale that the earth's atmosphere changed and became oxygen rich for the first time - triggering the evolution of life forms and ultimately creating humankind.

The symbiotic relationship between fungi and plants is made possible by the mycorrhizae, an underground network of microscopic fungal filaments entangled with plant roots.

Around 90% of all green plants have mycorrhizal symbionts. These networks are only visible to the human eye where they break through soil as fruiting bodies - better known as mushrooms. Our resident fungi enthusiast Manda Adolph has recorded twenty-three new species of mushrooms this month on Bealeswood Common.

Extraordinarily nine different small but colourful Waxcap species were among the new finds. Waxcaps are found only in undisturbed soil and hence are indicators of ancient, undisturbed grassland and of landscape history.
