Spring is in the air

There is an expression with which I am sure you are all familiar, 'spring is in the air'.

On the simplest of levels, it could be referring to the glorious birdsong that is beginning to suffuse the dawn or it could allude to the delicate scent of early blossoms; catkins, gorse, snowdrops and crocus as they emerge from their long winter sleep. However, there is a particular aroma that pervades the air of the forest at this time of year.

The cool earth of the woodland floor is awakening from its winter slumber. Bacteria that populate the damp leaf mould and the soil are starting to wake. The low watery sun begins to warm the ground. Actinomycetes (the bacteria) start to release a particular scent, an earthy, nutrient rich, metallic tang that fills the air and the nostrils. It's a similar scent to cool rain on parched earth during the summer.

That singular smell has a fabulous name, 'Petrichor'. The word is constructed from the Greek words 'petra' meaning stone and 'ichor' literally, 'the fluid that flows in the veins of the gods'...

Breathe deeply the next time the sun warms your path, for the blood of the earth is stirring beneath your feet.

News from Bealeswood Common

We've always known that Bealeswood Common is a very special place for wildlife, but what makes it an especially rewarding site to manage is the strong support from the village, with the recent high turnout for the annual working party being just one example of this. It is clear that the residents of Dockenfield view Bealeswood Common as a key part of the village, and one which they wish to protect.

Readers will by now be familiar with the Bealeswood Wildlife Recording Group (BWRG), a group of like-minded residents who have been studying and recording the varied wildlife on Bealeswood. The findings of this group have been hugely valuable in informing us of how various wildlife groups on Bealeswood are faring, their individual needs and requirements, and uncovering the presence of several unusual or rare species which would otherwise have gone unnoticed.

Although it can be tempting to focus on only a few key species groups, all wildlife species are in fact interdependent, with the success of one group often being closely tied to the presence and composition of other groups. Plants, in particular are the foundation on which the entire ecosystem is supported, providing food, nectar, shelter, nesting, and egg laying sites for a multitude of other species. Put simply, plants define the habitat, and the resources provided by that habitat determines which other species can thrive.

With this in mind, Waverley Borough Council commissioned a professional vegetation survey of Bealeswood Common in 2021. This provided us with a full list of plant species, complementing and validating the recording already carried out by the BWRG, but importantly it also identified specific plant communities. Although it is always useful to identify and record individual plant species, it is the distinct communities they form which defines the quality and uniqueness of the habitat. The professional survey found that the grassland on Bealeswood includes both nationally and locally rare plant communities, as well as flower species which are considered vulnerable or near-threatened in the UK.

One of the recommendations of the survey report was to put Bealeswood Common forward for declaration as a Local Nature Reserve (LNR) under the Wildlife and Countryside Act 1981. Natural England define a LNR as follows:

'A protected area of land designated by a local authority because of its local special natural interest and, where possible, educational and community value.'

Further guidance by Natural England also highlights the importance of LNRs for 'the study of and research into, matters relating to the fauna and flora of Great Britain and the physical conditions in which they live'. It then adds that LNRs should be 'of high value locally for environmental education and/or research, of high natural interest locally, and of high value locally for enjoyment of nature by the public.'

It is our view that Bealeswood fits this definition well, being an important site for wildlife conservation, of great value to the village, and already providing a research and educational resource for the BWRG, who then share their findings through site notices and a programme of walks and talks. We are therefore proposing to go forward with this designation, which as well as providing recognition of the importance of Bealeswood for wildlife and the involvement of the local community, will also give it some statutory protection.

It is important to note that recognition and status aside, this designation will not change too much on the ground. It is a local designation for local people and does not impose any obligations other than to continue managing the site for the benefit of wildlife, and for it to provide access to nature for local residents, which of course it already does. There is no requirement to install formal facilities, promote it to outside groups, or make any other changes.

As this designation is in a large part for the benefit of the local community, I am keen to hear your views before we move to the next stage. British Empire Medal for a valued member of our community.

Many residents of the village will know Jill Trout well. She can often be seen walking with or riding her pony along Batts Corner. She is a regular volunteer at the church Coffee Stop. You will find her selling ice creams on Dockenfield Day as part of the Activities Group. She has served for over 40 years as Clerk, then a member of Dockenfield Parish Council and thirty years as our Chairman. She has worked tirelessly as events co-ordinator for the Kingsley Organisation and has selflessly served our community, quietly getting on with what needs to be done with kindness, tenacity, and good humour.

So, it was with delight and pride that DPC learned that her nomination by Paul Wood (DPC) had been successful and that she was being awarded the British Empire Medal (BEM) in this year's King's New Years Honours List.

The honour was bestowed for her services to the village and for her charity fund raising efforts which have yielded hundreds of thousands of pounds for local good causes.

With a little gentle arm twisting, I persuaded Jill to share some of her thoughts about the award with us here at the DNL and it is presented here in Interview form.

Jill, where were you when you found out that you had received the BEM award?

"I had just returned from holiday. The phone rang, and the caller introduced himself as calling from the Cabinet Office, I thought it was a scam! He promised that it was not and if I checked my post, I should find a letter confirming the BEM award. Sure enough, the letter was there. It was only at that point I actually believed him."

Was it a surprise?

"Yes, indeed. I had no idea and I never imagined receiving anything like this. I did not expect any kind of gratification other than seeing improvements, protection and flourishing events in the village, enhancing community spirit. So, yes, it was an enormous surprise."

How did you feel to have been nominated?

"When I was told, I thought at first that the nomination had come from the Surrey Association of Local Councils (SALC). So, I was hugely flattered and overwhelmed to learn that the nomination was in fact from the local Parish Council and the villagers. It was so much more personal and that means such a lot to me!"

How did your family react?

"They were utterly delighted and pleased for me."

Are you looking forward to the awards Ceremony and do you know where it is and who will be presenting your BEM?

"The awards ceremony is taking place at Loseley House by His Majesty's Lord Lieutenant of Surrey. I have also been invited to a garden party at Buckingham Palace. I'm really looking forward to both."

What was the first fundraising activity that you undertook for the community?

"Many years ago, the inspired founder of The Kingsley Organisation, Judith, needed someone to organise the administration and asked me to help. Subsequently, the refurbished Kingsley Village School, needed extra facilities. The shop consisted of three or four metal cupboards. The Post Office needed its own space. Incidentally, Maureen the disabled volunteer running the Post Office took it to Dockenfield Church once a week. Alan, the CEO, suggested I approached Glaxco Smith Kline as some years earlier I was on the "Younger Maltings" committee helping to raise funds for the redundant Farnham Maltings for community use, so agreed to try. The bid was positive, so I kept going after that initial encouragement."

You have raised hundreds of thousands of pounds over the years. What types of activities have you undertaken to raise that enormous amount of money?

"There are many ways to raise money. Some large donations have come from Banks, Quoted Companies, and the National Lottery. We received funds from many local businesses, e.g. Coomers of Bordon made Kingsley their Charity of the Year, local garden centres, St.Mary's Trust (Frensham/Dockenfield), Hankley Common Golf Club are part of a long list that constantly give generously, both money and activities. Often local people donate, not just money but helping/hosting activities and giving their time."

What was the most difficult or arduous fundraising event you have been involved with?

"I wouldn't say that any of the activities have been arduous, the most difficult aspect is often the initial organisation of an activity and creating a community team. When you repeat the events, they almost seem to run themselves. We ran Annual Golf Days, multiple jumble sales, twice yearly bridge days, concerts, talks, children's holiday activities (much appreciated by working mothers!) We accommodated DoE tasks and accreditation and hosted University concerts for local students, etc."

What was the most fun or strangest event that you have been involved with?

"The event that was the most enjoyable and unusual I have been involved with was helping to organise the special parade to commemorate the centenary of the 1914-1918 War on remembrance Sunday in 2018. When three black Dales pony sisters led the parade and escorted the Standard to the Dockenfield War Memorial. Ridden by myself (on Pandora), Sue Hobday (Pearl) and Jessica Hobday (Philamena). All ponies born in Dockenfield. It was a very special and moving ceremony as the Dales ponies served in the War and few returned. It is now a rare breed."

What has been the most rewarding aspect of your involvement in the community from a personal perspective?

"I think it has to be helping to keep the regime of Bealeswood Common such that it is widely recognised for its uniqueness. I marvel that something so simple has developed into an area so special and interesting. 35 years plus of planned consistent management and recording initiated by DPC/WBC; implemented by the rangers; Wildlife Recording Group; with the help of local volunteers, thoughtful use by the residents; applying good, simple, appropriate management techniques and consistent dedicated observation has led us to understand and encourage the incredible diversity of our amazing little common and to it being recognised and protected. Also, long-term working towards inclusion in AONB for the whole village, resisting a large holiday village in Alice Holt Forest and fighting a toxic tip at the Frith End sandpit."

What would you say to encourage younger people and families coming into the village to get involved with the community?

"Come and join existing volunteers realise qualities each person has to offer and can gain by joining and creating community projects/activities in Dockenfield ... both great and small from larger events to collecting the odd can, etc. tossed from a car. A great start is helping out at Dockenfield Day, volunteer to lend a hand and enjoy the community spirit."

Very well done Jill, we thank you and we are proud of you.

Think of it in the same way as you would think of the evacuation leaflet on an airline. We all hope we'll never need to implement it but if we do, we'd rather it was clear, up to date, and that we had read it.

Bombed Out! A Family's True Story Of Chance, Luck And Love In The Blitz

I have just completed and released a book about my family's story of their lives during WW2. When their house in Chelsea was destroyed on the second night of The Blitz, they were made homeless. During a chance meeting with Dorothy Huitfeldt (Latham) in Peter Jones Department store where they were sheltering, my grandmother and her youngest children were offered sanctuary at Hollowdene Manor House in Frensham for a year or so.

This book tells first hand of their lives at this time with many descriptions of Hollowdene, its surroundings and the local people. They were privileged to be present during a visit to the house by Norwegian King Haakon VII and Crown Prince Olav, which was very memorable considering the poverty that they had been used to growing up in Chelsea. My aunts and uncles attended the local school (St Mary's) during this time, and all remembered the village and local area with great fondness.

Several years ago I and my cousin visited the area and called on the off-chance at Hollowdene where we were kindly invited in by one of the residents - Claire Beer - who showed us original plans of the house. We then went to the Helen Arkell Dyslexia Charity (at that point round the corner from Hollowdene) and were lucky enough to be invited to Helen's home where we had the opportunity to thank her for the support and kindness offered by her parents to our family in their time of need. I have written about these meetings in the book.

I wondered whether the book might be of interest to your readers. I also wonder if there is anyone remaining in the village who might remember my family.

Frensham and Dockenfield Horticultural Society: What to do in the Garden this month.

The soil will now be starting to warm up but do not be fooled into a false sense of security and go mad with sowing seeds. It is better to wait a few weeks, than to sow in haste and start sowing towards the end of this month and into April.

Onion and Shallot sets can be planted this month. From mid-month, you can also sow beetroot, spring onions, lettuces, radish, peas, spinach, summer cabbage, salad leaves, leeks, Swiss chard, kohl rabi, turnip and summer cauliflower.

Your seed potatoes can be laid out to 'chit'. After a few weeks you should see some short robust shoots, which will give them a good start when they are planted. Potatoes should be planted 12" (30 cm) apart, in a 6" (15 cm) deep trench. If the weather is warm, the first shoots will break through the soil within 2-3 weeks. Ensure you protect them from frost with fleece or "earthing-up". Planting Earlies by mid-March should mean that they will be ready by mid to late May.

After the hard winter frosts, it will be time to see what has and what has not survived, depending upon how warm it is, some plants may take more time than others, but it is safe to assume that if by the end of this month, there is no signs of life, then it is time to replace. Some plants may sprout from the bottom of the plant and therefore will need to be pruned back hard. If in doubt, ask a FDHS member!

You can move and plant shrubs this month. If you forgot to prune your summer flowering clematis last month, then do it now to about 12 inches from the ground. Trim your winter flowering heathers to avoid them from becoming leggy.

Beds can be mulched to lock in moisture, keep the weeds down and help feed the plants. At the same time you can also lightly fork in slow-release fertilisers, such as fish, blood, and bone or Growmore. Finish cutting back dead foliage from your ornamental grasses to allow the new growth to come through.

If you have not already done so, check your Dahlia tubers. Despite wrapping them up, some may have been casualties of the extreme frosts we had this winter, so any tubers that are rotten or shrivelled need to be cut off and pot up the remaining tubers under cover this month. In a shed or greenhouse will be fine.

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
